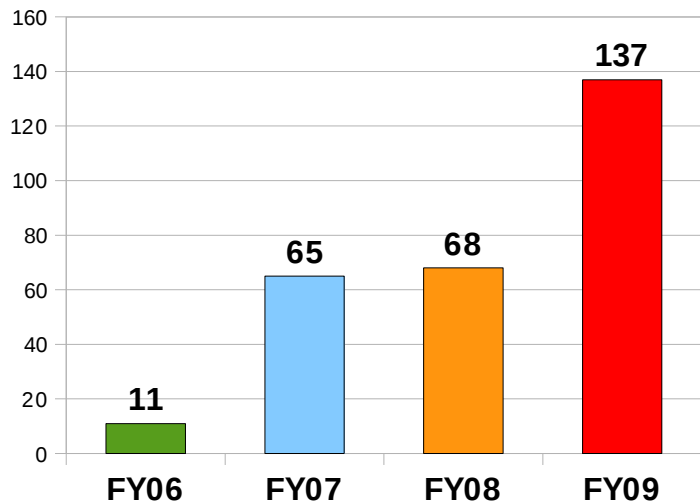
Events

By FY

During FY09 (from February 2008 to January 2009) the number of events organized/attended by Ambassadors doubled compared to the previous two years.

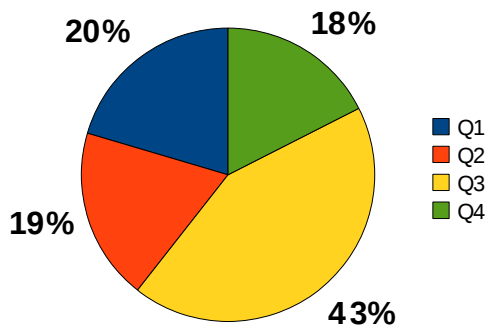
Why?

A new budget policy and a bigger budget, along with more powers to FamSCo, helped having more events sponsored and, consequently, more people encouraged holding/attending events.



Not only, initiatives like F9 and F10 Release Events had a big success among Ambassadors and clearly show the real potential of the community.

By quarter

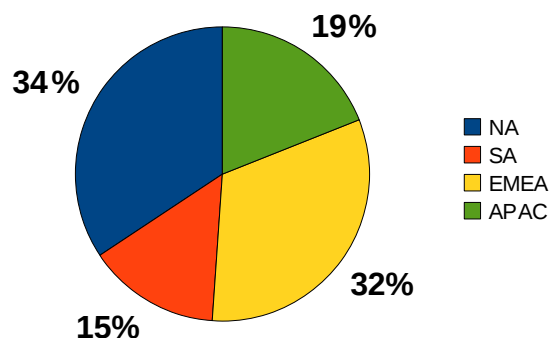


Like the previous year, Q3 was the quarter that had more events than anyone.

The main reason is that each region hold a high number of events, especially APAC and NA. This fact suggests, for the years to come, a better distribution of resources proportionally to the number of events hold by quarters in the previous FYs.

By region

According to this chart EMEA and NA are the biggest events holders. If we compare the number of events hold by regions in FY09 with the previous ones, we can see an harmonization between the regions. That's a clear demonstration of the local organization improvements, especially in SA and APAC. It's shows, moreover, that this is the right way to follow in order to have a balanced events distribution.

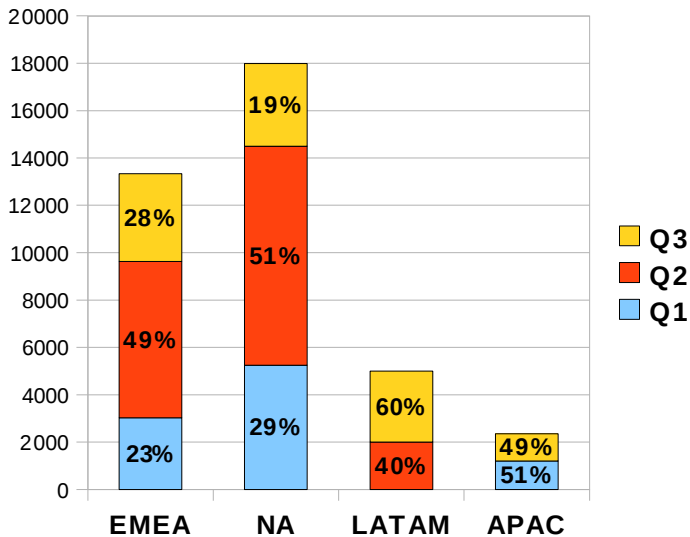
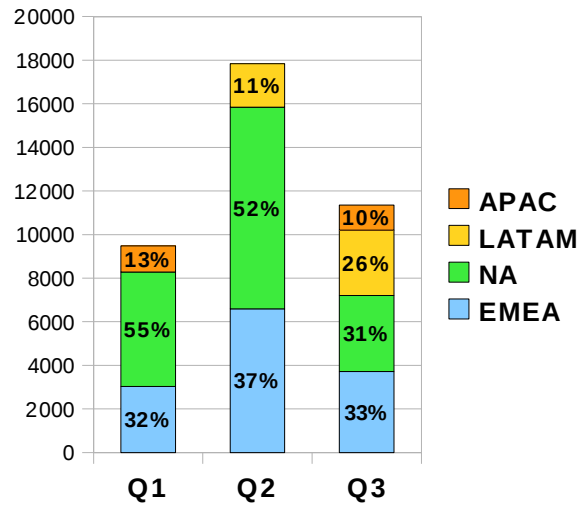


By resources

The charts, updated to November 2008 (Q4 is missing), clearly explain the distribution of FAmSCo's Budget around the regions.

The budget was distributed according to the events and the ambassadors' suggestions. Moreover, if in absolute numbers, the distribution couldn't seem equal for all the regions, we were able to cover all the events and all the initiatives in all those ones.

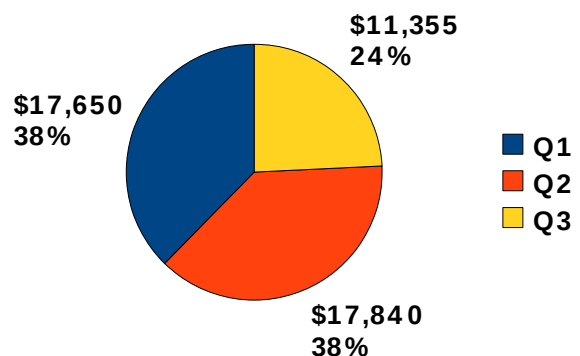
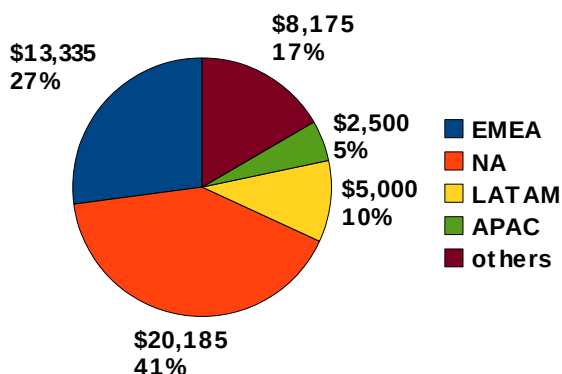
NA and EMEA result the regions that use most of the budget. Compared to the events charts (see the previous page), the numbers are well justify and make clear that money were spent rationally.



From a quarter distribution point of view, the graph also show the different distribution of events during the year for each country.

Next FamSCo, and the respective local contacts should take in consideration those data for a better distribution of resources along the year. It is also important to underline that both the overall growth of Ambassadors Project, along with local organization improvements, will rise resources requests. This will require a better addressing of budget in order to keep it in a good shape and guarantee the coverage of the events, or, at least, most of them.

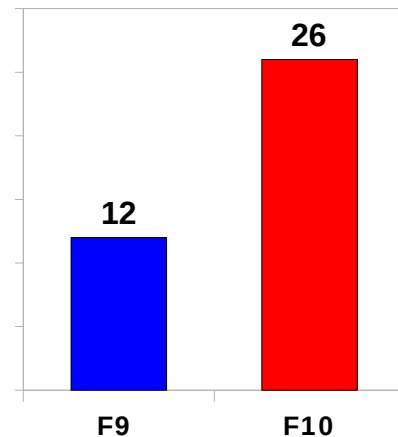
Release Events

New Membership Policies

Starting from September 15th, we changed the Membership policies. According to Joerg Simon, the Ambassadors Membership Administrator, the aims of this change are to "enhance the Quality of New Members experience" and "reduce Introduction Traffic to Ambassador List".

FAmSCo, after a thought review of all the reasons behind this proposal, agreed to adopt these modifications and the results were self-explaining in fact from 15/09/2008 to 02/12/2008 there were:

- Sponsored Ambassadors: 60
- Not sponsored Ambassadors: 113 (they didn't continue with the procedure)

Compared to the period that goes from 05/06/08 to 14/09/08 when we had:

- Sponsored Ambassadors: 211
- Ambassador become removed: 89
- Ambassadors that needed a reminder: 62

Meetings

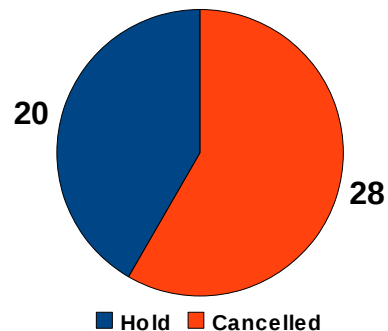
FamSCo meetings

Regional meetings

The unique weekly meeting organized before 2008 showed a lot of lacks, from the impossibility to have all the regions represented due to time zones to the lack of attendees. The idea sponsored by some ambassadors to split the general meetings with regional ones showed its effect: while the

discussion are focused on local problems and events, FamSCo can better understand and address the problems and the proposals each region moves.

Actually EMEA, APAC and LATAM hold monthly meetings, while NA holds weekly ones. If certain regions have regularly meetings (see NA and EMEA), the others are trying to figure out for the solution that best fit them.

Next FAmSCo should pay more attention on regional meetings, trying to have a member (or a delegate) attending those ones and should be more responsive to the problems/ideas moved during those ones.
